Hon. Counsellor Hisham Badawy stands among the foremost judicial and oversight authorities in the Arab Republic of Egypt, by virtue of his distinguished career in the public service and administration of justice, a career that has been marked by unwavering institutional discipline and profound legal acumen.

His career began at the Public Prosecution Service, where he was appointed Deputy Prosecutor General and subsequently assumed positions of increasing responsibility. In this regard, he exercised direct oversight over investigative and prosecutorial functions, particularly in matters affecting national security and the protection of public resources. From 2000 to 2012, he served as District Attorney of the Supreme State Security Prosecution, which afforded him unparalleled insight into strategically significant legal cases and the rigorous application of justice in accordance with the law. Subsequently, Counsellor Badawy ascended to the judiciary, assuming the presidency of the Cairo Court of Appeal, where he played a pivotal part in shaping judicial principles and fortifying procedural safeguards, thus reflecting his full adherence to the principles of judicial independence and proper administration of justice.

Counsellor Badawy was appointed as Assistant Minister of Justice for Anti-Corruption Affairs, a position in which he contributed decisively to advancing Egypt's national anti-corruption agenda, strengthening inter-institutional coordination, and refining both legislative and executive frameworks in alignment with international best practices.

From 2016 to 2024, he presided over the Accountability State Authority (ASA) at ministerial rank, leading the nation's highest authority for financial oversight. Under his stewardship, the Accountability State Authority (ASA) advanced the protection of public funds, strengthened auditing and control mechanisms, and implemented robust accountability measures, thereby enhancing the efficiency of public resource management while consolidating principles of transparency and disclosure. Meanwhile, he served on the Board of Directors of the National Bank of Egypt and the Financial Regulatory Authority, contributing substantively to enhancing the financial governance and operational effectiveness of Egypt's economic institutions.

At the international level, Counsellor Badawy earned the confidence of global oversight organizations, holding eminent positions, including First Vice President of the International Organization of Supreme Audit Institutions (INTOSAI) and Chair of the African Union Board of External Auditors. He has served as an external auditor for numerous international organizations, including the United Nations Industrial Development Organization and the World Tourism Organization, and has chaired the INTOSAI Working Group on Anti-Corruption and Money Laundering, underscoring his distinguished professional standing worldwide.

He also served on several national committees dedicated to promoting integrity and combating corruption, and contributed to the development of relevant legal mechanisms, including the penal code and counter-terrorism statutes, underscoring his pivotal role in reinforcing the State's rule of law.

Throughout his career, Counsellor Badawy has represented with distinction the Arab Republic of Egypt in numerous high-level international forums, participated in G20 and BRICS high-level financial oversight bodies meetings, and successfully managed Egypt's hosting of the INTOSAI Congress, which was highly applauded by the international community. Moreover, he has led the ASA delegations to United Nations meetings for many years.

Currently, he serves as Speaker of the House of Representatives for the Third Legislative Term, assuming his national role to sustain the constitutional framework, strengthen the rule of law, and advance parliamentary performance.
